Sewing bags to carry HOPE



Susanne Strand

A Psychological View of Violence Against Women 8:00 AM CST | Find your local time

Criminology professor Susanne Strand specializes in risk assessment and management of intimate partner violence, working closely with police and social services. She leads Sweden's RISKSAM program to develop evidence-based methods addressing intimate partner violence, stalking and honor-related violence, aiming to improve agency collaboration, reduce professional stress, support victims and expand treatment for perpetrators.

Tony Porter

A Call to Men - Ending Violence Against Women 12:00 PM CST | Find your local time

Tony Porter, author, educator and activist, champions gender and racial justice and is globally recognized for his work in preventing violence against women while promoting respectful manhood. At the Zonta Says NO Summit, he will address issues of manhood, male socialization and violence prevention.

A Conversation with Elizabeth Flock about Gender-Based Violence 4:00 PM CST | Find your local time

Elizabeth Flock, an Emmy Award-winning journalist and author, focuses on gender and justice, with work featured in the New Yorker, New York Times, The Atlantic, PBS NewsHour and Netflix, supported by the Pulitzer Center, PEN America and IWMF.

People in crisis from sexual assault leave the hospital without clothing, personal care items, and many times with no means to pay for a meal. Our Hope Bag project provides the forensic nurses at CRMC a way to give them help and hope.

For babies/children, women, and men:

- all sizes of sweat pants
- * t shirts
- underwear (including sports bras)
 - flip flops or slippers

Other items include:

- tooth brush/toothpaste
- comb/brush
- * | **s**mall soap
- travel size shampoo/conditioner sanitary pads or tampons

Fleece blankets and gift cards in \$20+ are also needed to provide victims with dignity and support after medical examinations.

Zonta Club of Cheyenne Member Spotlight:

Mary Walker has been a member of our club for 25 years! She first learned of Zonta through her work as a pharmacist at CRMC, where she worked for over 30 years, and had several Zontian coworkers.

Zonta's antique show is what drew her in, and she shared that in the 90's one of the ZI goals was literacy. The club had agreed to read to children at WIC on the days the parents had to sign up or renew.

Mary's group kept the children occupied and gave them a book at the end. Many had never been read to

They then went on to coordinate Raising Readers for many years led by Edith Garrett.

The thing that most excites Mary now about Zonta is that our mission is worldwide. After attending the ZI meeting in NYC she discovered just how much can be done and needs to be done.

The Club projects she is most interested in are the

16 Days of Activism Against Gender Violence, and the Hope Bags.

The woman who influenced Mary the most is her grandmother. Their backyard connected to hers and Mary spent many wonderful times in her kitchen and "helping" in her 100 year old Victorian home. Her grandmother was elected to the school board in the 1930's, and she came to Wyoming in a family covered wagon train and lived to age 96 having seen a man land on the moon, also Haley's Comet twice (1910 and 1985).

The advice Mary would give young women who want to make a difference in their community is to come try us (Zonta) out! We have fun, we support each other, we do make a difference.

Mary served on the District 12 board through the terms of 5 governors as a committee chair (service, nominating, vice area director, area director). She said strong women are very inspiring and support-

ive. When she applied to go into state government, letters of recommendation were written to the governor by Zontians. Later, Mary was proud that Jennica came to her to ask about her career change.

Concerning her hobbies and interests, Mary is known as "Granny Uber", happy to spend time with her Grands. She loves to read and travel (China, Russia, Norway, Europe, Cuba, New Zealand as well as US). Also, she and her husband built a log cabin from a kit in the

1980's near Centennial WY. She also has season tickets to UW football, basketball, and volleyball.

One fun fact about Mary that most people don't know about her is that her family hunted rattle-snakes for fun and she made hat bands from snake-skin.


Finally, when asked what super power she would most like to have, Mary said she would love to be able to stop bullying!

November Guest Speaker: Carla Thurin with Safehouse Services

The special guest speaker for our November Club Meeting was Carla Thurin, Director of Safehouse Services, and also a Zonta Club of Cheyenne member.

"Safehouse Services is a not-for-profit organization that operates a shelter, facilitates support groups and advocacy programs, assists with protection order filings, and provides 24-hour crisis care and safety plan-

ning" (quoted from the Safehouse Services website).

Their main source of funding includes several federal gran ts and other funds administered by the Wyoming Office of the Attorney General, Division of Victim Services; an annual fundraiser conducted in May; United Way; and private donations.

Carla has been with Safehouse for 26 vears and has been the Director for 24 of those years. The shelter has a staff of 12 (10 full-time, 2 part-time) and can accommodate 50-60 people. Volunteers are also appreciated, primarily for facility maintenance, help with manning information booths, etc. Background checks and training are required for any volunteers who provide direct services to residents.

There are two wings, one is pet friendly and the other is not. Pets have to be meeting. Safehouse provides an initial 30-day stay, which can be extended an additional three months due to the difficulty of finding jobs and housing. They provided shelter for 376 people last year, with an average stay

currently vaccinated and not be aggressive. Cheyenne Animal Shelter will provide shots if need-

of 38 days. Although services are primarily needed for female victims, male victims sometimes need assistance as well. Historically, they have had to house male victims in motels but they are currently working on creating a separate residential area for men.

> Although the facility is locked down, residents are free to come and go as needed. Facility staff will follow up if the resident hasn't returned as scheduled.

> Approximately 60% of residents do not have their own vehicles, so transportation is provided to appointments, jobs, etc.

> Donations are welcome including cash, pillows, trash cans (used for move-out kits), laundry baskets, toiletries, and personal hygiene items. Needs will vary from time to time. Donations may be dropped off Monday - Friday, 8:00am - 4:00pm, at
