












2024 Sílent Wítness March 2024

December 2, 2024, the Zonta Club of Cheyenne marked the end of the 16 Days of Activism with the annual Silent Witness March. Zonta members, community members and family members of domestic violence victims marched with a police escort from the Wyoming Supreme Court building to the Laramie County Public Library, holding silhouettes of women lost to domestic violence. At the library, the group assembled to share stories of their loved ones, and listen to a presentation by Mary Billiter, who has lived through spousal abuse and had to endure the abuse of her children at the hands of their father.

After Mary spoke, the silhouettes were taken into the hallway of the library where they stayed on display for a period of time.



Priyanka Dhopade

Senior Lecturer at the University of Auckland; Visiting Fellow at the University of Oxford

Priyanka Dhopade is a 2012 Amelia Earhart Fellow from Canada. After earning her Ph.D. in Australia, Priyanka began her postdoctoral position at Oxford University to work on commercial jet engines. Since joining the University of Auckland in 2020, she has shifted her research focus to sustainable engineering across more disciplines, incorporating space, energy, housing, Indigenous knowledge and equity in engineering. She

leads the Sustainable Space Initiative (SSI), a transdisciplinary research initiative focused on systems thinking for sustainability in and for space. I also worked with the NZ PM's former Chief Science Advisor at the science-policy interface to better inform environmental policy for New Zealand.

Beth Ebert

Senior Principal Research Scientist, Forecast Quality Team leader in the Australian Bureau of Meteorology's Research Program

Beth Ebert, a 1983 Amelia Earhart Fellow from the U.S., currently based in Australia, has a long-standing interest in weather forecast verification and evaluation. She holds a science leadership role in the World Meteorological Organization and brought natural and social scientists together to conduct research on improving weather warnings. Beth also works at the

nexus of weather and health, contributing to the development of new forecast services for heatwaves, smoke and pollen. In 2017 she was part of a cross-disciplinary team that developed the world's first early warning system for thunderstorm asthma.

Anna-Maria Kypraiou

Title A Fellow and Lecturer in Engineering at Churchill College University of Cambridge; Founder and CEO of Eye Sea Green

Anna-Maria Kypraiou, a 2016 Amelia Earhart Fellow is originally from Greece and is currently based in the U.K. Her research focuses on the reduction of pollutants and the development of energy optimization strategies in the maritime industry. She also studies the development of systems for the use of hydrogen in power generation, technology development for building energy usage

optimization and development of scientific methods to analyze building performance and the use of new technology methods to evaluate occupant well-being.

help and hope.


For babies/children, women, and men:

Upcoming Proclamation Signing of National Slavery and Human Trafficking Prevention

On January 15th at 3:00 pm at the State Capitol Building, there will be a proclamation signing of National Slavery and Human Trafficking Prevention Month, and it would be amazing if we could have a group of Zontians in attendance. This is being organized by Cara Chambers and the Division of Victim Services, of which Cara is the Director.

Here are a couple of housekeeping reminders before the event. There is free parking (2-hour limit) around the Capitol Building and down Capitol Avenue; please park in the appropriate designated areas. Walk up the Capitol steps and enter through the main entrance, take the corridor behind the rotunda staircase to your right, and follow that back to the Governor's Office where you will see a security desk.

Zontians should wait in the corridor outside the Governor's Ceremonial Conference Room where the signing will take place. There will be staff waiting who will escort us in when they are ready for us; there is some seating in the corridor. And perhaps we can all wear orange to separate our group from others in attendance.

There will be an opportunity for folks to comment on the proclamation and to take a group photo with the Governor. There will be staff present to take photographs, but you are welcome to bring your own cameras. What is the Zonta of Cheyenne Foundation?

Have you ever wanted to know more about the Foundation that helps support our Club? **Denise Parrish** provided the following article to help explain the creation, purpose and function of this Foundation.

The Zonta of Cheyenne Foundation was incorporated in 2013 and received its tax-exempt, 501(c)(3) status in 2014. It was created to assist with fundraising for the Zonta Club of Cheyenne and other projects that fit the mission of Zonta. It has its own Board of Directors – separate from those for the Club - but works as a partner with the Club on fundraising events such as CAN-CEL OUT and WyoGives.

The Foundation holds funds that it raises until they are needed and in order to build a nest egg for hard times. For instance, some of the savings were used to tide the Club through the financially difficult years of the recent Covid pandemic. Some of those saved funds were also used in order to donate a single large amount of \$20,000 to Comea in 2013. Furthermore, the existence of the tax-exempt entity allows us to receive grants and donations that might otherwise not come our way. As is common with other foundations, when funds are raised or donated at various events, agreements are reached – with the input of Club members - as to the amount of funds to be spent on current projects versus the amount to be saved for the future.

For much of the past year, the Foundation has had a \$25,000 certificate of deposit earning interest at an average percentage yield of 4.5%. That certificate of deposit was recently renewed through August, 2025 at a rate of 4.41%. This investment alone has brought in interest of more than \$1,200 in 2024. In December, the Foundation's Board decided to invest some additional funds and opened an 11-month \$7,500 CD earning at a rate of 4.1%. Meanwhile, some ready cash is still available in savings (about \$15,000) should it be needed for the Club's operations or unexpected projects fitting Zonta's mission.
