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

January Club Meeting—Celebrating Amelia

The January Zonta Club meeting was held at The Office Bar & Grill on January 9th, and was called to order at 6:00pm by President Belinda Sawyer.

Celebrations: Pam Pafford announced her engagement, Laura Gorny has a new grandson, Betty's granddaughter made the Dean's List, and Ann Erdman's granddaughter graduated with honors. Best wishes and congratulations to all!

Member Highlights:

Jody Gostas shared her interview answers as our spotlight member. Please see page 7 for Jody's full interview.

Fallon Bowie (Kim's daughter) spoke about her community service project, Fallon's Giving Bags. Fallon collects hygiene items for homeless people and for Cheyenne school students who may not have access to such items. The project started when she was looking for a community service event as part of competing in a scholarship pageant in late 2023 or early 2024. Not long after, she read online articles that some students in Cheyenne-area schools didn't have access to hygiene items. Ideally she would like to have the bags available in each school. The bags for schools will include soap, toothpaste, toothbrushes and shampoo as well as feminine hygiene products as it can be especially embarrassing for girls to have to ask the school nurse for help in getting such items. Another goal is to provide bags for local homeless shelters. Bags for the homeless will include items like body wipes that don't require water, since homeless people often don't have easy access to water or bathing facilities. She hopes to be able to include such things as wash clothes, gloves and socks to help homeless people survive Cheyenne's brutal winter weather. Minutes of the last meeting: The December meeting was the club Christmas party at which no minutes were taken. November minutes were included in the Zephyr and emailed to club membership. A motion was made and seconded to approve the November minutes as submitted. Motion passed.

Treasurer's report: The Treasurer's report was previously included in the Zephyr. There being no questions or discussion, the Treasurer's report was placed on file for audit.

NEW BUSINESS

Education Fund: Members present discussed whether the club should set aside funds that would help send members to conferences, etc. A motion was made and seconded to set aside 10% of net fundraiser proceeds for a professional development fund. Motion passed.

The 2025 GRIT Conference on Human Trafficking and Exploitation will take place in April in Bozeman, MT. Registration prior to February 1 is \$299 for one person, \$747 group rate for three attendees, \$996 group rate for four attendees, and \$1,245 group rate for four attendees.

A motion was made and seconded to donate up to \$1,000 from WyoGives proceeds to increase the corpus of the club's LCCC Scholarship Fund. Motion passed.

January Guest Speaker—Cheryl Bean

Cheryl Bean, P.E., involved with Arts & Aviation Steering Committee and the Wyoming Aviation Heritage League (WAHL), presented information about her organization. Cheryl is a native of Cheyenne, and a former Zontian. She worked in bridge design for the State of Wyoming, then transferred to aeronautics, retiring a couple of years ago.

The terminal that was built in the 1920's is currently the post office building at the corner of Evans and Central Avenue. A larger terminal building was built next door in the 1960s and was used until the new terminal was built a few years ago. She became interested in saving the older building when it was vacated after the current terminal was built.

The Arts and Aviation Steering Committee was formed about two years ago. Arts Cheyenne, Cheyenne Regional Airport, City of Cheyenne, Wyoming Aviation Heritage League, are some of the organizations involved. Among other efforts, the group hopes to get the building listed on the National Register

They also performed public outreach by making presentations and participating in events of the City Council, County Commission and other local organizations, social media, website, articles, and interviews.

The group is working with the Wyoming Department of Envi-





Zonta Club of Cheyenne Member Spotlight:

Jody Gostas

My name is JoAnne Gostas though I'm known as Jody. (My mother didn't like the name JoAnne and called me Jody from birth!!)

I first heard about Zonta from my husband Ted Gostas. He had been invited to speak at the Denver Zonta Club luncheon in maybe 1976 and was so impressed by the women he met there. I met him in 1977 and he urged me to see if there was a Zonta chapter in Cheyenne. Lo and behold! I worked with Priscilla Berwick who was a devoted Zontian and it took off from there.

I had worked for Amnesty International before moving to WY and was always interested in improving the status of women worldwide. When Ted & I married, I had the chance to attend evening meetings since he could be home with my child. The more I attended meetings, the more I was certain Zonta was an organiza-

tion for me. When I finally attended an International Convention, there was no doubt in my mind. The international outreach was so moving, impressive. The Zonta Club of Cheyenne has worked long and hard to increase awareness of human trafficking particularly of women. This has been my special interest for several years with our Club.

Ruth Bader Ginsburg is a woman I admired

ever since she was appointed to the Supreme Court. I hadn't known much about her before but was very impressed by her story and her determination to continue to

fight for gender equality and human rights. I know she would have loved to see ERA become part of our Constitution as I do.

There are many organizations in Cheyenne that support women and I would urge young women to research these. They exist in civil rights, artistic expressions, religious pathways. Some are more in tune with younger women as a lot of the service organizations are aging and losing their vitality. Explore, ask your friends, be adventurous, daring, and bold (isn't "Bold" our District password??).

I have few hobbies. I spend 1-2 hours a day studying French (one would think I could speak?), I read a lot and I try to exercise with a diverse group of women 2 times a week and I work

with a personal trainer 2 times a week. That goal is to be physically fit enough to continue doing some traveling. I have 3-4 destinations still on my bucket list!

A little known fact about me is that I hitch-hiked with a girl friend from Paris to Greece and back when I was 23.

Super power? I wish I could heal the pain in people's hearts. I don't know; I'll have to think about that.



Equity in Education—From our ZI President

Equity in education is the cornerstone of a diverse, equal and inclusive society that values everyone. Prioritizing education for women and girls yields transformative results: breaking the cycle of poverty, fostering economic growth with wage increases of 10-20% and reducing gender-based violence and child marriage. Educated girls make empowered choices, marry later and have fewer children, which protects them from vulnerabilities later in life.

Yet, without equal educational opportunities, women and girls cannot fully realize their potential. <u>UN Women outlines the stark challenges they face</u>:

- Women comprise more than two-thirds of the world's 796 million illiterate people.
- Rural women's deficits in education have long-term implications for family well-being and poverty reduction.

Children of mothers with no education in the Latin American and Caribbean region are 3.1 times more likely to die than those with mothers who have secondary or tertiary education and 1.6 more likely to die than those whose mothers have primary-level education.

Opportunity and representation are powerful catalysts for educational equality, one of the four vital focus areas of **Zonta International's Strategic Plan**. Our initiatives, such as the Amelia Earhart Fellowship and Zonta Young Women in Leadership, Zonta Women in Business Leadership and Zonta Women in STEM Awards, address barriers to educational and professional advancement and success. Awardees receive financial support to pursue their aspirations and become part of a vibrant community that fosters their learning, growth and future work.

As you read further, consider the barriers you faced in your education and how you can help remove them for future generations. Providing equal education and opportunities for women and girls means creating equal opportunities for all.

A brief history of Zonta District 12

The Growth of District 12

[probably written in the 1960's by the District 12 Historian of that time, Mary Rausch]

It was our second GOVERNOR, BARBARA CROSS (1954-56), who realized that a district only 2 or 4 years old was, like other pioneers, too busy MAKING history to take time to write it. It was Governor Barbara who kept our first permanent record, the District Scrapbook.

At the 1964 District Conference in Billings, the recommendation to have a written history was reactivated.

The early history of Zonta in the Rocky Mountain region was closely interwoven with the history of the DENVER CLUB. As you all may know, the Confederation of Zonta Clubs was organized in 1919, with 9 charter clubs – 7 of them in the state of New York. Eventually it grew to Zonta Clubs, Incorporated, and to Zonta International when Zonta chartered a club in TORONTO, CANADA in 1927.

This same year Lindbergh made his non-stop flight across the Atlantic. No, AMELIA EARHART did not join the Zonta Club of Boston until the next year.

For the first two years of its existence, the Zonta Club of Denver was included in District E of the Confederation – the 4 other clubs in this District being in Seattle, Los Angeles, Dallas and Honolulu. Denver's nearest neighbors were the club in Chicago and St. Louis – in another district.

Never to be daunted in the West, Zonta's progress continued. After Zonta International was incorporated and throughout the Depression Years, the minutes of the Denver Club show frequent assessments for organization, with Colorado Springs, Salt Lake City and Kansas City – the new clubs Denver most desired. Largely though [sic] their efforts the Kansas City Club was chartered in 1937 with Salt Lake following in 1939.

In 1940 DENVER entertained the 20th Annual Zonta International Convention in Estes Park – and the eastern clubs began to see for themselves the need for more clubs in the Rocky Mountain Area. A re-districting has been accomplished and Denver was now in District VII along with Kansas City, Minneapolis and St. Louis. Wyoming was assigned to this new district as a "Field of Endeavor."

Talk about travel time: Delegates from Kansas City traveled 650 miles. Delegates from St. Louis traveled 800 miles; Des Moines, 800 miles; St. Paul and Minnesota, 1,000 miles; and Duluth sent a delegate 1300 miles.

What a district! There, in solitary splendor, sat poor Denver – chartered 21 years before in 1927, alone in her mountains. If ever a club had a valid excuse for becoming a rugged individualist, that club would have been Denver. The Denver Club again entertained the 20th [sic 28th?] Annual Zonta International Convention in 1948.

District VII became too unwieldy because of the great distances and isolation. At the Houston Convention in 1951 the famous "cutting of the herd" took place and District XII when 11 clubs emerged as a separate entity.

Well, District XII's record of achievements is most enlightening. For example, the Glendive Club held a money raiser called "Little Z" – a calf purchased by the club "which ate its way to a top price in the sales ring in a pasture belonging to one of the Zontians." We do have a unique imagination!

We've come a long way, Zontians. Now we are known as District 12 of Zonta International and our active states are Colorado, Montana, South Dakota, and Wyoming. As our new Governor stated, "Let's be proud of Zonta. Have fun in all that we do, as it is a great honor and privilege to be a member of Zonta International."
